

Open Educational Resources: Getting Started

Through participation in the Open.Michigan Initiative, University of Michigan faculty, researchers, and students are making their learning materials available as Open Educational Resources (OER). By applying open copyright licenses, these resources become freely available for use, remixing and redistribution to instructors, students, and self-learners worldwide.

Join the growing numbers of U-M faculty, researchers, and graduate students who are maximizing the impact and visibility of their work by making it open and freely available to the global learning community. Through the Open.Michigan OER Initiative, U-M teaching professionals are learning how to:

- Create their own open content
- License, publish, and promote their resources
- Connect with other collaborators
- Maximize the impact of their research
- Extend the reach of their teaching

Step-by-Step to Open Content

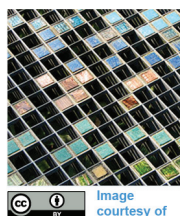
License your Work

The first step in creating open content is stating to others how you want them to use the content. By selecting an open license, you retain the copyright to your original work but give permission to others to copy and distribute your materials—provided they give you credit, and only on the conditions you specify.



Use Openly-Licensed Content

If you want to share your materials, why not create them using open content right from the start? Fortunately, there are several websites and repositories that you can browse to discover openly-licensed images, clip art, video, learning modules, music, and other relevant materials.



Cite your Sources

Now that you've found open content, you need to give proper attribution to the creators of these materials as you assemble your educational resources and projects. Make sure you credit the creator, provide the URL where the work is hosted, indicate if it is available under a particular license, provide

a link to the license (so others can find out the license terms), and link to the original resource.

Share your Work



The most exciting part of creating open content is sharing it. We can help you publish and promote your content through the Open.Michigan Educational Resources website open.umich.edu/education or guide you to a number of our favorite content sharing sites that enable you to publish, promote, and

collaborate with others around your OER.
